Week 1: Eggy Week

Please ensure that there is adult supervision when looking at and doing these experiments.



Use various materials to protect Eggy. Bubble wrap, card, plastic bag, cotton wool, string or wool, junk materials, plastic casing etc

Create a parachute. Think about what material you should use to make the parachute. In needs to catch the air so may be a good idea to practice with a few different materials first.

See how many times you can throw egg whilst keeping is intact, without it cracking or breaking.

To make the activity less messy use a boiled egg. You can then unwrap it to see how intact or how cracked it is.

Materials

Paint Potaoes Paper Paint brushes





Ingredients

-Mini Eggs

- Cereal of choice, corflakes, rice crispies or shedded wheat

- Chocolate

- Melt chocolate in bowl over hot water
- Stir in cereal
- Place in mixture onto cake cases
- Place two or three mini eggs in the middle
- Allow to cool and chocolate to set

- egg cartons














Super Egg Comic Strip

Experiment with your food

Plants need water, air and sunlight to grow. Did you know they can grow without soil? You can make your own cress head to prove this! Experiment using a homemade greenhouse to see if a greenhouse helps the cress to grow. Grow one in greenhouse and one on its own... which one grows better. Why?

Materials:

- Cress seeds
- Two eggs or yoghurt pots
- Kitchen roll
- Cotton wool
- Felt tips or paint
- Clear plastic drinks bottle
- Scissors

How to:

- 1. If you're using eggs, boil the eggs until they're hard boiled. Take the tops off gently. You can eat the boiled eggs try them with toast soldiers yummy! Clean the inside of the eggs gently, so they don't break. If you're using yoghurt pots, clean the inside of the pots.
- 2. Draw a face on the egg shells or yoghurt pots using felt tips or paints.
- 3. When the paint has dried, wet some kitchen roll and put it in the bottom of the egg shells or yoghurt pots.
- 4. Wet some cotton wool and put it on top of the kitchen paper. Make sure there is a gap between the cotton wool and the top of the egg shells or yoghurt pots.
- 5. Put some cress seeds on the cotton wool and press them down gently.
- 6. Put your egg shells or pot in a sunny, warm spot try a kitchen windowsill.
- 7. You can make a greenhouse to put over one of the egg shells or pots. Ask an adult to cut the top off a plastic drinks bottle. Put the bottom half of the drinks bottle over the top of one yoghurt pot or egg shell. The inside of your greenhouse will be warm and damp.


When the cress gets green leaves on top of the stalks, you can eat it! Cut the tops off the stalks and try them in a sandwich or a salad.







